Speaker: Jef Jaeger, UNLV Associate Professor in Residence with the School of Life

Sciences

Native to southern Nevada, the Relict Leopard Frog suffered a substantial decline in range and numbers by the end of the 20th century. In 2001, the species became the focus of an intensive, multiagency conservation effort that is centered on managing populations and systematic monitoring. Professor Jaeger's presentation will focus on the history of this conservation program, along with its successes, setbacks, and limitations.

Jef Jaeger is currently an Associate Professor in Residence with the School of Life Sciences at UNLV, where he teaches courses in introductory biology, biogeography, conservation, and ecology. Dr. Jaeger maintains an active research program, with much of his effort now focused on amphibian conservation. He currently chairs the Relict Leopard Frog Conservation Team and is the vice chair of the California/Nevada Amphibian Populations Task Force. His work on the Relict Leopard Frog extends back to the late 1990s. He has a B.A. in environmental studies from the University of California, Santa Cruz, and an M.S. and Ph.D. in biological sciences from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas (UNLV).

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Since 2019, Wetlands Park Friends is the nonprofit, 501(c)3 organization dedicated to promoting conservation, awareness, and appreciation of Clark County Wetlands Park through its educational programs and activities.
